supported by over 100 partners which include, Plan India, MAMTA HIMC created partnership with NIRA in Rajasthan to facilitated the examination in schools and oriented the children and teachers about the initiative. After conducting the examination volunteers of NIRA helped in assessment of answer sheets and facilitated the

data entry work to help the result of Olympiad examination. This olimpiad was conducted in Rajasthan from September 13 to 20th 2023.

The exam was divided into five levels, among the students of Class 1-8, containing Multiple Choice Questions (MCQs) on health and hygiene. Students between class 1-2 appeared for level 1 examination; Level 2 exam was taken by the students of class 3-; Level 3 exam was for class 5-6, level 4 for class 7-8, and level 5 was taken by the students of 9 and 8.

A total of 15 students (three in each category) across the country, won in the five levels of the exams, and were awarded with cash prizes.

One winner was announced from each state and union territory and select winners was felicitated in person at the launch of Dettol Banega Swasth India Season 10.

Inculcating the simple practice of hygiene among children is extremely effective against several diseases. Research

findings shown the direct interconnection between the reduction of diseases and regular handwashing with soap, especially at critical times of pre-meals, post-defecation, and pre-feeding babies.

In many situations, however, both access to hygiene facilities and support for essential behaviours are lacking in India. Dettol Hygiene Olympiad 2.0 under its flagship campaign Dettol Banega Swasth India, supports good basic hygiene practices among children and encourages them to attain positive hygienic habits that last a lifetime. NIRA deployed 114 volunteers to facilitate the exam. Total 25 Districts Includes-Ajmer, Srigagnagar, Kota, Baran, Rajasmand, Udaipur, Dungarpur, Banswara, Chittorgarh, Bhilwara, Jaipur, Dausa, Karauli, Bundi, S. Madhopur, Jhalawar, Jodhpur, Pali, Jalore, Sirohi, Tonk, Bhilwara, Nagaur, Bikaner, Sikar, Jhunjhnu were covered with about 45000 students of roughly 300 schools were participate in the examination.





From the state of Rajasthan Mr Naveen, Bikaner and Sakshi of Kota got the winning award of the Olympiad. – Naveen a resident of Pugal, was chosen as the Dettol Hygiene Olympiad 2.0 second winner. He is a student of Class 3 at the Mahatma Gandhi Government School in Pugal, Bikaner. Naveen is belongs to a low-income home. Sakshi, Kota, Rajasthan, a resident of Ladpura, Mawasa, Kota, Rajasthan, participated in the Dettol Hygiene Olympiad 2.0 and came out as a winner. She is a student in Class 6 at the Government Upper Primary School. Her parents work as day labourers. She is part of a large family, which increases the hardship for day to day needs to be met.
